



EKEV - THE CONNECTION TO ISRAEL

The Jewish story is interwoven with the Land of Israel. The Torah revolves entirely around

our journey towards Israel, and the books of the Neviim are all about our national life there. We are exiled from Israel and our greatest hope is to return there. We celebrate the newborn Jewish State of Israel, we rejoice in its success, and feel the pain of its failures. Israel's victories are our victories, and its losses hurt us as they are our losses. Israel is the focal-point of our aspirations - nationally and individually.

Perhaps these feelings have never been so fierce as they have been over these past 10 months since October 7. Since then, we have prayed for Israel, its inhabitants, its soldiers and the hostages; we've visited (against conventional logic which suggests not visiting a war zone), volunteered, and donated. We've perpetually checked the news (and the flight routes) concerned about the next loss and hopeful for a glimpse of positivity. Our eyes and hearts are constantly cast upon Israel.

Not only is Israel our aspiration, it is Hashem's. Not only are our eyes cast upon it, but so are Hashem's (Devarim 11:12):

A land Hashem, your God, looks after; the eyes of Hashem your God are always upon it, from the beginning of the year to the end of the year.

What does it mean for Hashem to "look after" the Land, or that His "eyes are always upon it"? Rashi, citing a pasuk in Iyov, understands this to mean that what happens in Eretz Yisrael is not haphazard; Hashem runs the world and provides for Israel based on what is appropriate at any given time. As Hashem tells Iyov (38:24-26):

By which way is the west wind parted, or the eastern one spread it over the Earth? Who

has cut a channel for the torrents and a way for the cloud of the thunderclaps? To rain on the Earth where no man is; a desert in which there is no man.

But if indeed it is true that Hashem runs the world, asks Rashi, then surely He "looks after" all lands, not just Israel? This is indeed the simple understanding of God's message to lyov: Hashem is not merely the God of the Land of Israel, but of the entire universe! This philosophical question to our verses leads Rashi to introduce a ground-breaking idea:

If one can say so of God, He cares for that land alone, but through the care which He bestows on it, He cares also for all other lands with it.

Israel is the epicentre of divine intervention, the catalyst for world history. Israel may be the Land of the Jewish people, but the events occuring there - the tone and culture we create - affect all people. Our story may be a unique one, but it bears global implications. The connection towards Israel that we cultivate in ourselves and our children have far-reaching implications. Israel is the backdrop to the story of the Jewish people, and it is through the land of Israel that we interface with the broader story of humanity. Our connection to Israel is the lens through which the Jewish people impact and influence the world.

It is in this context that I am overjoyed to introduce the 5785 cohort of KTM Shlichim to our community! In addition to the Weinberg family returning for their second year, we are overjoyed that our bachurim - Itamar and Nadav - and bnot sherut - Shira and Tehilla - have chosen to dedicate a year of their lives to enhancing the Montreal Jewish community's connection to Israel through inspiring learning, engaging programming and especially through the first-person connections formed with them.

Since October 7th, we've witnessed a troubling surge of antisemitism, manifesting in various forms across the globe. This modern-day prejudice, often cloaked in political rhetoric or social commentary, echoes the age-old hostility that the Jewish people have faced for centuries. As we explore the Torah and its eternal messages, we are reminded that the Jewish experience, including the hardships and misunderstandings, is deeply intertwined with the teachings of the Torah—teachings that have been misinterpreted and misrepresented, sometimes leading to dangerous consequences.

"Carve for yourself two stone Tablets like the first ones." (10:1)

Michaelangelo may have known a thing or two about painting, but when it came to Jewish anatomy he was a bit off. When he painted Moses, he gave him little horns. Michaelangelo's problem came from a mistranslation of the Hebrew word keren. It's true that keren does mean a 'horn,' but it also means a ray of light. The English word corona, meaning a glowing halo, is probably a derivation of keren.

How did Moshe get his 'horns'?

After the Jewish People heard the Ten Commandments at Har Sinai, Moshe ascended the mountain on the 7th of Sivan to receive the rest of the Torah. He came down on the 17th of Tammuz and was greeted by the sight of the golden calf. Moshe smashed the two tablets on the ground.

THE INK OF ETERNITY

These first tablets were made and engraved by Hashem. They contained the entire Torah: the gemarot and the agadetot, etc.—everything that was necessary to carry out The Maker's instructions. For example, the first tablets included all the details of how to make tefillin: they had to be perfectly square black boxes made from the hide of a kosher animal. Similarly, it was on these two tablets that Hashem inscribed all the specifics pertaining to the laws of Shabbat. However, when Hashem gave Moshe the second tablets they only contained the Written Torah. The detailed instructions, the Oral Torah, was given to him verbally.

After Hashem forgave the Jewish People for their infidelity with the golden calf, Moshe ascended the mountain again on the first of Elul to receive the second tablets. He came down 40 days later, on Yom Kippur. When Bnei Yisrael saw Moshe, his face was shining with a radiant corona.

Why didn't Moshe's face shine before?

The Midrash says that when Moshe had finished writing the Torah, some of the ink that was left over in his pen touched his face, and that's where the radiance came from. However, the Torah itself says the rays of light came from speaking to Hashem. But Moshe spoke to Hashem many times before. Why only now did his face become luminescent?

And which was the real cause of the aura? The ink in the pen or speaking to Hashem?

One would think that the second giving of the Torah was a second-class affair. After all, the first tablets were written by Hashem on rock hewn by Hashem, whereas the second tablets were the work of man, and only the writing was Divine.

It sounds like the first giving was on a higher level, doesn't it?

On the contrary! When Hashem first gave the Torah, the Jewish People were to be the vessel that would contain the Torah. Like the Holy Ark, we would hold the Torah but we would not be part of the Torah, just as a box only contains what is inside it. It's not the thing itself.

But with the second tablets, the Jewish People became part of the Torah itself.

The beams that came from the ink that was left in the pen of Moshe was the Oral Torah. Hashem put into the mind of Moshe Rabeinu—The Rabbi, the teacher of Israel—the Oral Torah. All the verbal instructions that were originally written on the first Tablets were now engraved in the mind of Moshe. Everything that is possible for a mortal understanding to attain was written in the mind of Moshe. The ink of eternity in the pen of Moshe was one and the same as Hashem talking to him.

Thus, the Jewish People became partners in the Torah. We became the parchment on which Hashem wrote with the ink of eternity.
